Suggestions.

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During winter season, advisable that Troops should be supplied with warm clothing for head and ears, the helmet not being of much protection altho. improved by allowing ventilation by means of handkerchiefs stuffed into top. The sudden change from warm cars to outside cold is very great especially when there is any wind.

Before leaving the ship, the Valises were packed with:- 1 large trunk, old clothing and cleaning gear, books, tobacco &c. Pipe clay boxes being divided between every 3 to 4 men. I found this arrangement excellent, as no other change of clothing was required during the journey by land, and bags could not be got at. Bubba, buckgumow, straight boards, mew & playing cards or bubbay are most necessary in my opinion. Here we had in sufficient numbers provided by the Detach^t.

SOLDIERS IN TOWN.

They will arrive this morning from Quebec and if fine have a

(From our own correspondence.)

QUEBEC, March 21.—For the first time since the Imperial Government withdrew its garrison a detachment of regular troops passed through here to-night en route from England to the Pacific coast. Unhappily, as far as the event itself was concerned, but little attention and very few people paid a single soldier very much to welcome them. The detachment consisted of 55 men of the Royal Marine Artillery under command of Major Rawstorne. They came out by the Allan steamship Laurentian, arriving at Halifax on the 20th instant, and after a somewhat long, but not unpleasant passage, they arrived at Lewis shortly before 5 p.m., and crossed by 7 in the midst of a heavy snowstorm. The men were in heavy marching order, with overcoats strapped and without any protection from the cold other than the waterproof cape covering their heads. They, of course, wear the artillery uniform and white helmets, and the only difference between them and our own troops is that they wear white wooden gloves and have no spikes in their boots to grip the ice and hold in the snow. In spite of this they marched as steadily as if they had been accustomed to snow roads all their lives, although by their sunburned faces it was evident that they had become accustomed to warmer climates than that of Canada. They are fine, tall, well built men, every one of them, and would be a credit to any service. A more soldierlike body never trod the streets of Quebec. The Canadian Pacific railway has brought the commissariat cars down to within a quarter of a mile of the ferry and the men marched the intervening distance. Surgeon J. C. Wood, R.N., and Mrs. Rawstorne and maid accompanied the party. Major Rawstorne dined at Chateau Frontenac; the men being provided with supper aboard the cars. Major Rawstorne and Surgeon Wood called on Colonel Montizambert, commandant at the Citadel, during the evening and left with the detachment to board the Canadian Pacific railway train at 10 p.m. This will arrive Montreal early to-morrow morning, and if the weather is fine will parade through the streets in order to give the men exercise. They are to be employed in fortifications at Esquimes to do garrison duty and mount guns on the new fortifications. This work is expected to be completed in five years. The men are all long service men, being enlisted for 21 years, short service not having been adopted in the Marine corps. The age of the men has ranged from five to ten years in the service. Some have even put in from 15 to 23 years. Among them is a man who had a terrible experience. His name is James Sawyer and he was on board H.M.S. Victoria when she was run down and sank. At the request of Major Rawstorne he recounted his experience to the GAZETTE correspondent. He had just been relieved and gone to sleep when the accident occurred. He awoke to find the water tight doors, and failing in that ran on deck. The collision nets were got out, but it was soon seen that the ship was doomed. All hands were piped off, and the lawyer was given every chance for himself! The vessel had a heavy list, and those on deck had hardly time to climb over the upper side and jump into the sea when she toppled over and sunk, taking with her all the men below in the hulls. Sawyer says that on coming to the surface of the water he found himself badly bruised on the side and the clothing torn nearly off him. He, with some others got hold of a side that had not been injured, but there many on another side of it and it turned end and sank, taking several men with it. Lawyer kept himself afloat till he could get hold of a plank by which he was saved. He was swimming around and the planks up in one of the boats Dredgashore. Mr. G. Blake, of Canadian Pacific railway, accompanied the men to Vancouver, and a way official here exerted influence to make it possible for the men to get passage with deep discounts.

The Dominion Government propose to send some selected Officers and men for a short course of training at Halifax, but we have ample experience to know that it is impossible that these Officers & men would be competent to perform the duties of Instructors and Superintendents after such a course as this.

I would therefore make another suggestion i.e., that two Officers and 15 men of the Marines who have been specially trained for the purpose during the last 2 years and who have done excellent work should be sent to Esquimalt for 2 years to Superintend the formation and training of the Auxiliary Corps, & that 2 Officers and 15 men of the Permanent Artillery should be attached to them during this time in order that they should succeed the Marine Officers and men at the end of that period.

This would give a total expenditure of about £2450. per annum for the personnel.

It is difficult to compare this scheme with that proposed by the Dominion Government. In the latter case it would appear that the establishment of the permanent Artillery would be raised from 100 to 135 in order to provide for the S.M. Defences. This would mean an additional cost of about £3500 per annum as against £2450.

The Dominion Government scheme would necessitate the withdrawal of 75 men from their Artillery duties at the outbreak of war when their services would be especially required in preparing the armament.

A large number of the Artillery men would also have to be employed in ~~the~~ Submarine mining during the annual practice, whilst a small force of 2 Officers and 15 men would be permanently employed in the duties previously enumerated.

It is probable that the permanent Artillery Company does not contain sufficient men of the requisite qualifications for the work i.e., Boatmen, Electricians and Engine Drivers principally

It should be possible to prepare & lay out²⁰⁹
the Defences of Esquimalt in two days or
perhaps rather less, but to do this would
require considerable skill on practice on
the part of the numbers now proposed

After the Defences have been laid out,
one half of the Militia or Volunteers might
possibly be allowed to return to their homes
(if these are close at hand) being called out
again in case of emergency on the men might
be required to undertake other duties, for instance
to assist in the Artillery defences.

The conditions of Service of the A.M. Militia
and Volunteers at Home might be sent for the
information of the Dominion Government as a
guide to the period and amount of Training
required, but the question of pay and allowances
and other conditions necessary for Canadian

received full investigation.

As a matter of cost it would
appear that each Regular (including Officers)
would cost about £100 a year - The
Auxiliaries should cost about £15

The Regulars would instruct the Militia or Volunteers at their Station, the vessels & Stores and the Store buildings for the Defences being used for this purpose, there would be no extra expense on account of this instruction, the cost of both Personal & material being fixed solely by the requirements of the Defences.

The number of Regulars i.e. 20 Officers & 15 N.C.O. and men has been found by much practical experience to be the minimum which can efficiently discharge the duties of maintaining the vessels & Stores, and of practice and Instruction in time of peace, this is also the smallest number which could undertake the work of Supervision in time of War. These Officers & men would be constantly employed in Submarine Mining and could not be made available for any other duties.

The number of Militia or Volunteers is largely regulated by the time which would be spent in laying out the Submarine Mine Defences.

The term "School of Instruction in
Submarine Mining" which has been used in this



NEW YORK, July 15.—An Ottawa despatch says the Canadian Government has forwarded a reply to the Imperial Despatch received last month relative to the proposed defences on the Pacific Coast. It was announced in the House of Lords that the Dominion Government had consented to maintain 100 men of the Royal Marine Artillery at Esquimalt, but this statement was premature. A despatch requesting the Canadian authorities to do this had been forwarded to Ottawa, and the reply just sent embodies the views of the Government on the matter. The request to maintain this Imperial force at Esquimalt is respectfully declined, the Canadian authorities proposing in lieu thereof to build earthworks on the Straits of San Juan de Fuca, at a cost of £15,000, to maintain a battery of Artillery at Victoria, and keep an effective Militia force in British Columbia. In return the Imperial authorities are asked to supply the armament for these fortifications, and to maintain a force of Royal Marines to handle the guns. The ground is taken that the Imperial interests are as important on the Pacific coast as those of the Canadian, and it is therefore held but fair that the expense should be equitably divided.

Sir I am directed by the Marquess of Ripon to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 9th instant requesting that a representation may be addressed to the Government of Canada with a view to obtaining payment of the passages of the wives and children of the Royal Marines now arriving at Esquimalt.

I am to request that you will draw the attention of the S.C. of the Admiralty to the letter from Their Department of the 9th June last (N. 2. C. 1234/1929) in which their Lordships consented to accept a fixed annual payment by the Dominion Government of £7,000 to cover all charges in connection with the detachment, such as pay, extra pay, passage money &c. but excluding provisions otherwise provided for.

In these circumstances Lord Ripon fears that it would be useless to approach the Canadian Government on the question of increasing that payment during the currency of the existing agreement.

I am to add that his Lordship does not understand why this question was not raised at the time the arrangement was negotiated. It
